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ANNUAL NJROTC MILITARY INSPECTION

NJROTC Cadets conducted the Annual Military Inspection (AMI) on February 19th in the school football stadium. Cadets were inspected by the Area 21 Manager of the Navy early in the morning, with the official inspection beginning in the afternoon.

The company ordered 0-4 platoons, which correspond to the students in each NJROTC class period, to "fall in," which simply means to get into standing formation based on the platoon assignments.

Awards and promotions such as ranks and ribbons were given out to recognize outstanding cadets who showed they went above all.

Then, our weekly inspection was done, which involves a commanding officer standing in front of the group to inspect uniforms and test knowledge of military information like general orders or regulations.

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'SQUID GAME' MAKES MASSIVE COMEBACK AFTER 3-YEAR HIATUS

Squid Game season two has been in the works for more than three years, and the results have been incredible overall.

Hwan Dong-Hyuk, the creator, writer, and director of Squid Game, spent more than 100 billion South Korean Won on season two, which in US dollars is about 84 million dollars. This far exceeded the budget of 31 billion South Korean Won, about 21.4 million US dollars, that were used in the first season.

Each episode of season two was about four times the cost of every episode in season one, which was from 3 billion South Korean Won, 2.4 million US dollars, to 14 billion South Korean Won, 14 million US dollars.

The amount of money that both seasons made may look little, but it is significantly different, because as the first season made 1.2 trillion South Korean Won, about 900 million US dollars, the second season made about 1.5 trillion South Korean Won, which is about 1 billion US dollars.

Even though the audience had to wait three years for the new season, there were many reasons for why, as Hwan Dong-Hyuk had to hire many actors and had to maintain a large crew, took a much longer time building the season two sets, as they were much more larger than season one, and the filming took 1 year because of the large group of actors that had to be in almost every episode.

Protests have spread across the country after President Trump issued several executive orders that drastically changed the immigration policy in the United States. These changes have already begun to impact immigrant communities across the country.

One of the most controversial aspects of the new policy is the administration's decision to use the 1798 Alien Enemies Act to conduct mass deportations of immigrants accused of gang affiliation, bypassing traditional court hearings. This move has raised concerns for many communities.

Protections against deportation for over 300,000 Venezuelans residing in the U.S. have been revoked. Individuals who previously relied on Temporary Protected Status (TPS) or other relief measures will now face deportation, leaving many families in uncertainty and fear.

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THE SEASON THAT GOT AWAY: BIGGEST NFL DISAPPOINTMENTS OF 2024

Nobody had a worse late 2024 than Bengals, Jets, and 49ers fans. From a disastrous season for a Madden-coverrunning back to a Hall-of-Fame-worthy quarterback, it's safe to say that these three teams were the biggest letdowns of the 2024 NFL season.

Unfortunately for Bengals fans, hopes of knocking Patrick Mahomes and the Chiefs out of the race in the AFC Championship have officially come to an end. But there's no one more frustrated than Joe Burrow.

Burrow didn't hold back his exasperation even after a mid-December win against the Tennessee Titans, with cameras catching him uttering "It's embarrassing" from the sideline.

"I was just frustrated with the day we had on offense," he told reporters post-game. "It was too sloppy. We had too many penalties. Too many procedural penalties. I had too many turnovers. It was just a frustrating day on offense."

"Sloppy" sums up the Bengals' season perfectly– largely due to Zac Taylor's defense.

According to CBS Sports, their loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers marked the sixth loss where they've allowed over 25 points and the fourth where they've allowed at least 33, and that was still with 5 games left in the season (finishing 9-8).

On the bright side, Joe Burrow had a historic season, finishing 90.4 overall and 89.3 in passing grades, which put him at second in the league– his defense just never seemed to show up.



For Aaron Rodgers and the Jets, it was the complete opposite.

Rodgers put up one of the worst performances of his career after coming back from an Achilles tear, filled with overthrows and interceptions to the point that opposing teams can't help but feel bad.

"I think he's an older guy, doesn't want to take big hits like that anymore," said Seattle's defensive end Leonrard Williams after returning an interception for a 92-yard



touchdown in week 12. "So, sometimes if you feel the guy coming full speed at him, he's going to chuck it and duck."

The Jets finished with a discouraging record of 5-12, forcing them to make some tough decisions regarding the quarterback position for 2025. For Rodgers, this could unfortunately mean the end of his long career.

While most people likely wouldn't have predicted this kind of season for the Bengals and Jets, the most surprising disappointment is the 49ers after a victorious year of making it to the Super Bowl.

But quarterbacks and defenses weren't the main reason for their 6-11 record– injuries were their biggest opponent by far.

The 49ers had zero snaps with star running-back Christian McCaffrey and receiver Brandon Aiyuk, two of their top touchdown scorers in 2023.

As if that wasn't enough, linebacker Dre Greenlaw also m[‡]ssed the entire season due to an Achilles tear in the Super Bowl in addition to shortened seasons for Trent Williams, Talanoa Hufanga, and Javon Hargrave.

If there's one good thing coming out of this season for the 49ers, it's motivation for next season.

"I think we are all pissed off in the right ways," said Christian McCaffrey. "I think it's a good place to be."

With a long off-season ahead, these teams have a lot to think about if they want a shot at redemption in 2025.


