

### "Lessons I Learned"

boat," I never imagined I would be standing here. When I first stepped foot on Troy's campus, I was entirely clueless about my future. Now, standing here at graduation, I know exactly the direction I'm going in life! Just kidding, I'm just as clueless as freshman year, but I do know that my experiences at Troy will serve as the foundation of whatever I decide to do in the future. The past 4 years have been enlightening to say the least. I personally cannot count how many Spanish presentations I made (well at least now I know 15 is quince and not diecicinco), I learned that sometimes diamonds are produced from the pressures of procrastination, and who would've thought that the difficult times at Troy might actually bring people together! But I figured, since we've all seen the once clueless freshmen mature into aspiring models, journalists, entrepreneurs, and engineers, (oh and did I forget doctors?), since we've all witnessed how our eye bags grow exponentially on the daily during the college app season, and we've all heard about how we are "the worst case of senioritis" Mr. Rod has ever seen; so today, I would like to share some lessons I learned through the journey of high school with my fellow classmates, because it's 2019 and sharing is caring.

Maybe we're not quite ready for them today, but I know we'll be ready someday. If we don't get there, we'll get somewhere. And I hope that the belief in someday, the dream of somewhere, will be our solace in midst of the ceaseless cluelessness of life.



I've just found 10,000 ways that won't work."

In different example of perseverance, in April, Troy had great privilege of hosting Congressional Medal of Honor recipient, Sergeant Leroy Petry for a talk with our NJROTC. During his talk he spoke of basic training for the Army Rangers and how difficult it was for all of them. Sgt Petry stated, "They would run, and run, and run." They were being pushed to failure. He said, "You would look to your left and to your right and you would see people sucking wind worse than you and struggling, and falling behind. But you don't leave them behind. You pick them up and bring them with you. Someday, you will be the person sucking wind more than the others, and you will need someone to pick you up and not leave you behind." In 2008 Sgt. Petry, lived this truth when he did not leave fellow soldiers behind while they were under heavy enemy fire in Afghanistan. Shot in both legs and grievously injured losing his right hand throwing an enemy grenade away from and saving his men, it was his fellow soldiers that continued fighting and helped helicopter Sgt. Petry out of the war zone. When his fellow soldiers needed him, he was there to pick them up. When he needed his fellow soldiers, they were there to pick him up.

None of us know the future or what it will hold. What all of do know is to prepare for the future and this is what you have done you entire life and especially the last four years. You are graduating today because of your hard work, and with the support of family, friends, and teachers. Continue to look out for one another and help one another. Let your legacy be not only one of academic achievement and personal fulfillment, but also one of caring for others. The road to success and fulfillment will have challenges and you will have to overcome them. You have the tools. At Troy, you have built your foundation and it is strong. I have every confidence all of you will succeed in creating the rest of your structure, your future, and be the next generation of citizens and leaders our country and world desperately need.
