Principal's Commencement Address

Good evening Troy Family and Friends!

Again, welcome, and thank you to everyone joining us tonight, as we celebrate our Troy High School Class of 2023!

The Class of 2023 is extraordinary. This is our graduating class from Year 1 of the COVID-19 Pandemic. They had to take on challenges for which they had not asked nor could have been prepared. None of us were. These students seated tonight on the field, and graduating together—they stayed together. The Class of 2023 embodies the spirit of a U.S. Marine saying, "improvise, adapt, and overcome."

We know what happened as the 2019-20 school year ended—we ended the year at home then we held a virtual graduation for the Class of 2020. In 2020-21 their sophomore year we continued with Distance Learning and then Hybrid Learning. In 2021-22, their junior year, we were all able to return fully to in person learning with masks and school began to feel normal. This year, 2022-23 their senior year we were in school with no-COVID restrictions, we had to keep telling ourselves we are back to normal. Each year of their high school experience including this one, they have continued to improvise, adapt, and overcome.

Each summer, schools receive their California State test scores from the spring. Last year as juniors, this class put up some outstanding numbers on the State tests, significantly outpacing State and county passage rates in mathematics, English Language Arts, and Science. On our AP exams this class was a key part of the highest schoolwide scores on AP, IB, and Cambridge exams since 2018. The Class of 2023 did not get weaker as a result of the pandemic, they built resiliency, and capacity, they became stronger.

To our Class of 2023, take a moment to reflect on the past four years. Keep thinking, perhaps your reflection should go back much further. How have you become who you are today? How have you accomplished goals and set new ones? Who are your teachers, mentors? Who inspires you? Earlier tonight, three members of this class gave commencement addresses that touched on some key aspects of achievement, choices, and development. Isabelle spoke of character development, taking risks, growth through failure, with supportive family and teachers there for her as she followed her convictions with purpose and passion into the future. Asha, spoke about the Troy High School experience and the potential, humanity, character, achievement, confidence, and pride in their accomplishments possessed by this class. Saiya spoke of metamorphosis and how she, her friends, and others changed each year, and sometimes in unanticipated ways. Improvising, adapting, overcoming, all while learning and moving forward while redefining the meaning of "perfection." The discovery that it is Ok to try new things, without fear of disappointments discouraging you from being the best you can. You can make time for hobbies, friends, inspiring others, and finding balance ...finding balance along this journey are important keys to moving forward in life.

Here is something all of us know, or at least something we should know. Nobody graduating tonight, or ever, got there by themselves, not on this field, and not in this stadium. Nobody is "self-made." Everyone has become who they are because of their teachers, beginning with their first teachers, parents and family. Troy parents and families have entrusted us with their most precious gifts, not relinquishing their teaching roles, but allowing us to add to their children's growth and development. Now as graduates, they have reached this point in their lives, with the experiences and knowledge that have shaped them to be who they are today, and will continue to influence them in the future. They are prepared and are ready for their next challenges in their

lives, which is always true of Troy graduates, and has never been more true or important than today.

I would also like to mention that two very influential Troy teachers are retiring this year. Mr. Don Allen taught Computer Science at Troy for 30 years, and has been indispensable to our Computer Science and Troy Tech Magnet Program. Mr. Allen Stubblefield, led our NJROTC for ten years then officially started our Cyber program six years ago. We will miss both of them, and their work has positively impacted the lives of thousands of our students over the years.

The Class of 2023 have dealt with disruption and uncertainty, circumstances that no high school students have had to deal with for over a century since the last major pandemic. Throughout the nation, few high schools or school districts have been nearly as successful as the students in FJUHSD and Troy High School. It was critical that we never stopped high quality live instruction during Distance or Hybrid Learning, and our students never stopped learning. Without the instructional lull, over the past four years this class bonded together, raised their achievement levels and beat the pandemic. Without coincidence, tonight the entire Class of 2023 is graduating from Troy High School. Yes, you heard that right, every 12th grade student at Troy High School and member of the Class of 2023 is walking across the stage tonight. There are zero Summer graduates or non-graduates this year. Not one. None of our Counselors remember this happening before, so it has been at least twenty years. This class is very strong.

The Class of 2023 will graduate with over 80% meeting U.C. "a-g" and 99% of these students in the Fall are attending college and universities with a few also enlisting in our armed services. This is not an exhaustive list, but a few of the colleges and universities our students are attending, with many going to a couple of our truly excellent local schools, Cal State Fullerton and Fullerton College. We will also have numerous students attending many of the University of California schools including UCLA, Berkeley, San Diego, Irvine, Santa Barbara, San Francisco, and Riverside. Students are also attending California State Universities; Fullerton, Pomona, San Diego, San Luis Obispo. Additionally, students are going to Stanford, Cal Tech, MIT, Harvard, University of North Carolina, Rochester Institute of Technology, USC, Northeastern, Arizona State, Purdue, Boston University, Columbia, Baylor, Embry-Riddle, Brown, Cornell,

Princeton, Claremont McKenna, University of Michigan, University of Rhode Island, Wentworth Institute of Technology, Hawaii Pacific, Georgia Military College, Chapman, Syracuse, NYU, Carlton, Pepperdine, Howard University, Wheaton, Vanderbilt, Drexel, George Washington University...I could keep going...We also have students who have accepted appointments to West Point, Air Force Academy, U.S. Coast Guard Academy, and U.S. Naval Academy. We are so very proud of all our graduates.

Tonight, as we celebrate the Troy High School Class of 2023, we know they are ready to begin their journeys into the future. They will continue to lead by example. They will change the world. Their values of kindness, appreciation, love, humility, tolerance, and confidence, buoyed by their shared experiences the past four years have made this class of seniors stronger than many before them. They are ready to continue taking on new challenges and become leaders in a changing world filled with endless possibilities. I am so proud of our seniors. They are already creating a world that is a better place for everyone, and I know the Class of 2023 will continue making a positive difference.

Seniors, you are all family, you are Warriors, and this will remain true forevermore.

Congratulations, to our Troy High School Class of 2023! Now, more than ever, it is a great day to be a Warrior!
